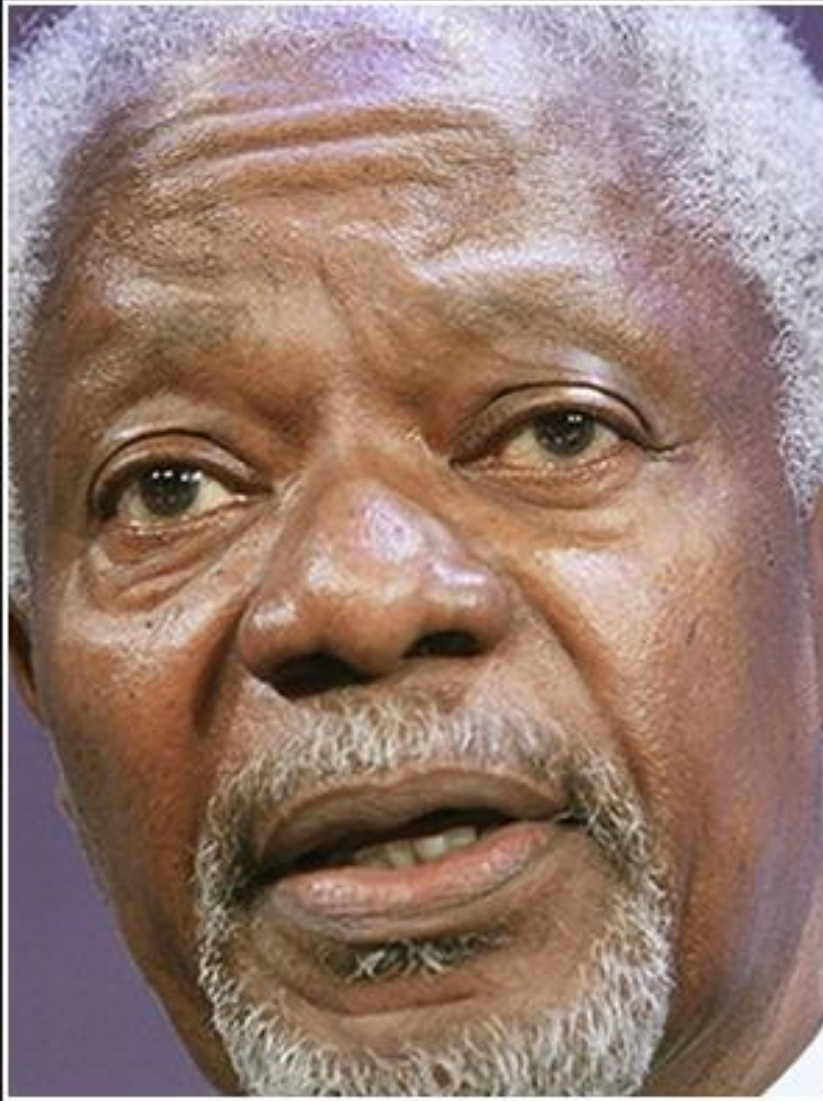
Many of us tend to think our way of doing things is the only way to do something. It may be hard for us to accept those who follow different religious practices or who worship in ways different from what we are accustomed to.

But, when we engage in dialogue to understand the customs, behaviours, and beliefs of others, we can begin to let go of the differences that may have kept us apart or made us fearful and intolerant of the other. It takes courage to be open-minded and not feel threatened by the beliefs of others. We can feel challenged when we are confronted with questions about our way of doing things. We can feel uncomfortable also with the questions others have of our religious beliefs.

As Jesus says in the Gospel passage we have just heard, do not judge others.

Rather than judging, let us try and listen, to understand and be more accepting of others and their religious customs and beliefs.
