

EXAM CONTENT: LANGUAGE

PAPER 1: EXAM

1 hour 45 minutes (80 marks)

Section A: Reading – one literary text:

1 hour - 40 marks

Read one text from either the 20th or 21st century and answer 4 questions to demonstrate the following skills:

- ■locate information in a text & make inferences,
- ■analyse language devices
- **■**analyse structure,
- ■critically evaluate a text

Section B: Writing: 45 minutes - 40 marks

One creative writing task: 40 marks 24/40 marks for content and organization 16/40 marks awarded for spelling, punctuation and grammar.

PAPER 2: EXAM
1 hour 45 minutes (80 marks)

Section A: Reading - two texts expressing a viewpoint: 1 hour - 40 marks

You will be asked to read two texts from either the 19th, 20th or 21st century and answer 4 questions to demonstrate the following skills:

recognise true statements based on the text,

•summarise texts, comparing content

•analyse language devices,

•compare writers' ideas and perspectives

Section B: Writing: 45 minutes - 40 marks

One writing task: 40 marks- Writing to present viewpoint.

Paper 2 – 2 hrs 15mins

Modern Drama –30 marks + 4 marks for SPAG

Pupils answer one question based on the text studied in class:

An Inspector Calls by J B Priestley

Or

Blood Brothers by Willy Russell

Poetry Conflict Poetry – 30 marks

Pupils answer one comparison question on a poem studied in class from the conflict cluster

<u>Unseen Poetry – part 1 - 24 marks</u>

Pupils answer one question based on a poem not previously studied

<u>Unseen poetry – part 2 - 8 marks</u> Comparison


How can I make sure I'm prepared and well-revised?

Buy Revision Guides – and use them!

Through Parent Mail app, revision guides can be purchased for all elements of language and literature course.

You don't need them all!

One language (either 5-9 or 7-9), one 19th Century Novel (either Jekyll OR Christmas Carol), one Modern Play (either Blood Brother OR Inspector Calls) depending on set and ability.

Read your teacher's comments on previous assessments.

Make sure you understand the targets set.

Practice, practice!

Find specimen exam questions. Have a go at answering them, and then check yourself against the mark schemes

You could even try writing different openings for stories, or non-fiction writing from a point of view, giving your opinion on a particular topic



Re-read the texts

you have studied, or watch productions/ film versions of them to remind yourself of the plots, characters and themes.

Create mind maps






Using images to help you remember key quotes and colours to group ideas with help to create a visual memory of the information



Provide a work space – a comfortable, quiet place to study, conducive to learning.

Ensure your child attends
Period 7 regularly.

Monitor your child's Sims homework account and check they are completing the work set on time.

Encourage your child to read broadsheet newspapers, watch the evening news and keep up-to-date with contemporary documentaries in preparation for the Paper 2 writing task.

Ensure your child's attendance does not dip below the expected 95%

Keep in touch with school.

If you have any concerns about your child's progress, please contact the English department.

Your child will make revision flashcards in school.
Test them regularly on the key quotations.

Encourage your child to read fictional texts at home. This will help them to develop their vocabulary.

Flashcards are a revision strategy that can be created and then used again as you test your understanding.

Try putting a quote on on one side and key information about it on the other: methods, meaning & context.




